# History of Agriculture in Illinois

### 1837: Invention of the Steel Plow in Grand Detour, Illinois

Agricultural pioneer John Deere invented the steel plow in order to improve farm productivity in 1837. The invention of the steel plow began the modernization of agriculture that we see today. The steel plow became so popular amongst agriculturalists that Deere founded his company, John Deere, in Moline, Illinois, where it has grown into one of the largest Agricultural Manufacturers in the world, annually generating \$60 billion in revenue.

### Mid 1990's – Present: Modern Era of the Farm Bill

Global Ag trade saw major reform in the early 90's, seeing the founding of the World Trade Organization (WTO) and ratification of the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA). The Federal Agricultural Improvement and Reform Act of 1996 saw the transition from payments coupled to market prices and production, and removed acreage restrictions that previously had been a feature of federal agricultural policy. The Agricultural Risk Protection Act of 2000 reformed crop insurance and cut costs for farmers. The Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 supported the use of ag products for biofuels. 2012's farm bill introduced two crucial programs, Agricultural Risk Coverage and Price Loss Coverage

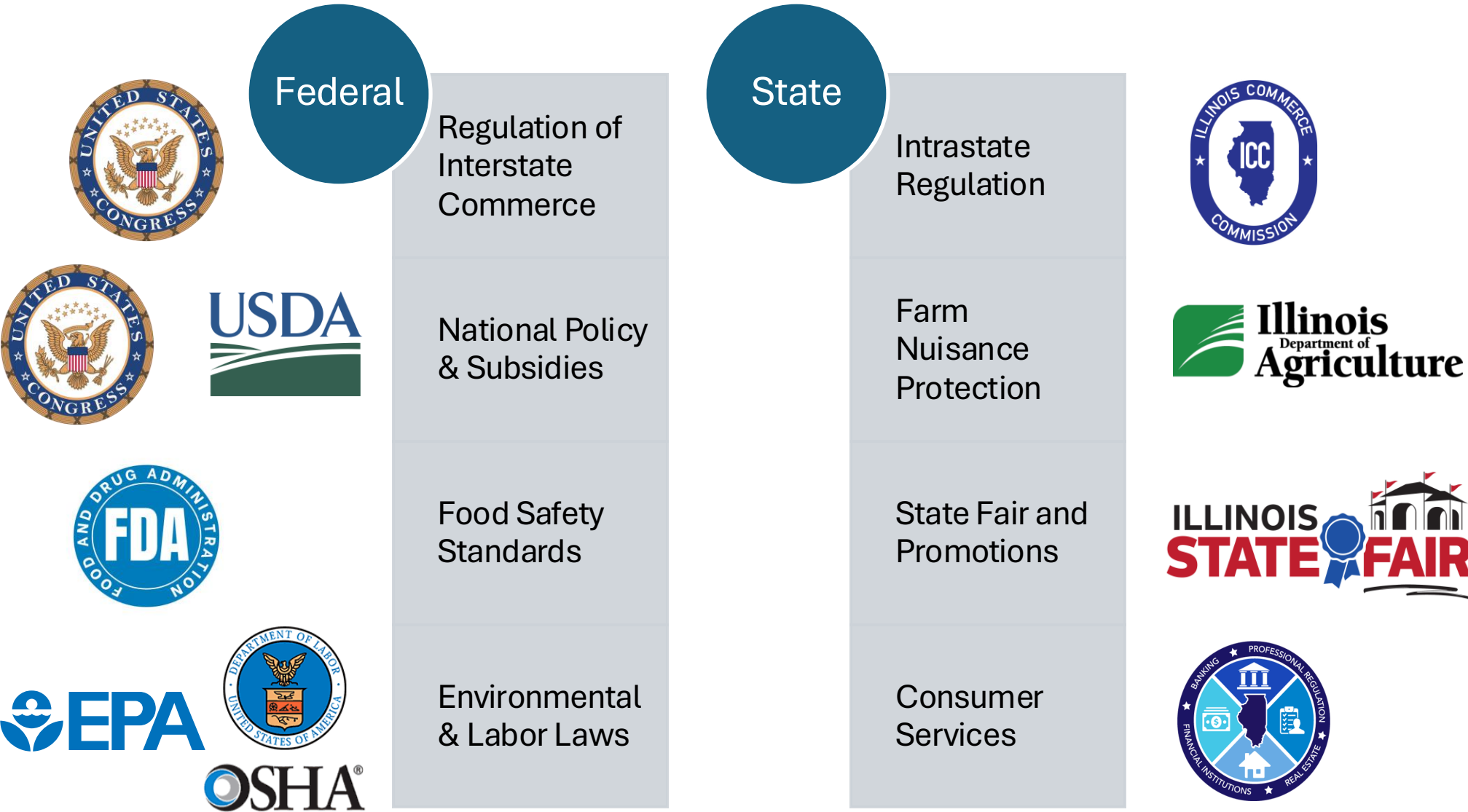
The 1980's farm crisis, often considered one of the worst economic crises since the Great Depression of the 1920's-30's, arose from a variety of causes such as the Nixon soybean embargo and Russian grain transactions in wake of currency changes, inflation and other changes. In 1977, total farm debt bypassed gross farm income, and remained that way through 1985.

# Funding Programs

### Ag Invest Program

- Administered by Illinois State treasurer's office
- Used to finance annual operating costs or secure long term loans
- In the Ag Invest Operating Line of Credit, a borrower can have a single line of credit up to \$600,000
- In the long-term program, a borrower can borrow multiple times a year up to \$800,000. Any project greater than this amount is considered on a case-by-case basis.

### Beginning Farmers and Ranchers Loan

- Administered by United States Department of Agriculture
- To qualify you must not have operated a farm or ranch for 10+ years, not own a farm or ranch 30% of the average sized farm in their county, meet loan eligibility requirements, and participate in the operation substantially

### Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)

- Administered nationally by United States Department of Agriculture, operations, eligibility, and distribution handled by state agencies.
- Many low-income households are eligible for SNAP payments that can be used for financial assistance to buy food at authorized retailers and some farmers markets. 85% of the 2023 farm bill went to funding nutrition assistance programs. (\$604.9B)

# General Information

Illinois agriculture consists of roughly 76,000 farms that span 26.7 million acres at an average size of 351 acres per farm. 75% of land area is used to farm the 1500 soil types we see in Illinois.

Although the average value of farm ground in Illinois is \$8,930, farm ground in prime central Illinois counties can go for as much as \$22,500

Illinois is the 2nd leading producer of corn (2311.1 M bu.) and largest producer of soybeans (688 M bu.) in the US as of 2024

Agriculture in Illinois contributes roughly \$51.1 billion annually to the economy. Illinois consistently places as a top 3 state in exports of agricultural commodities, shipping out \$8.2 billion annually.

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Approximately 200,000 jobs are supported by the agricultural supply chain of Illinois.

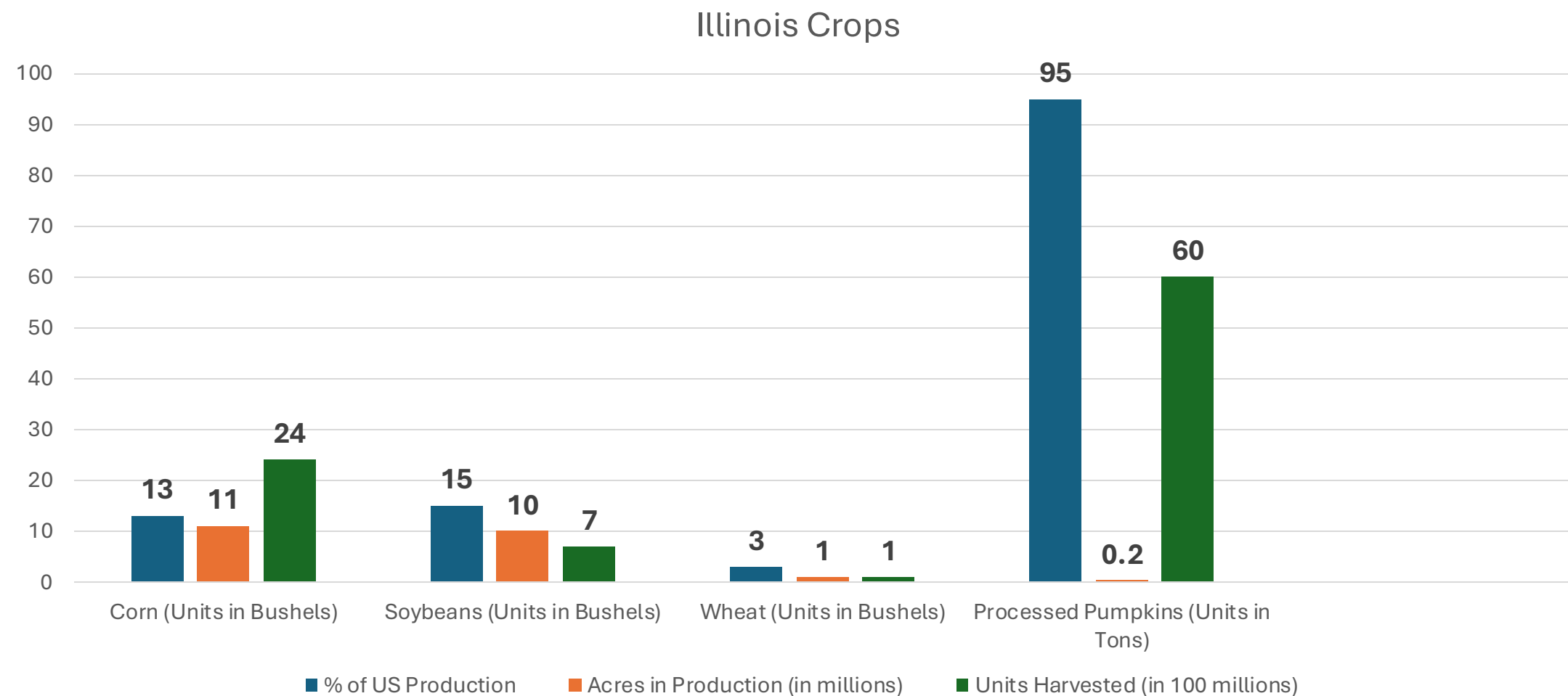
Illinois produces the 24th most beef cattle, 4th most hogs, 19th most chickens, 15th most eggs, 22nd most sheep, and 16th most milk goats in the US

John Deere is headquartered in Moline, Illinois and takes up \$142.99B of the Farm Machinery Global Market Cap, 2nd most behind Caterpillar, who's single source manufacturer for large Bulldozers is in East Peoria, Illinois

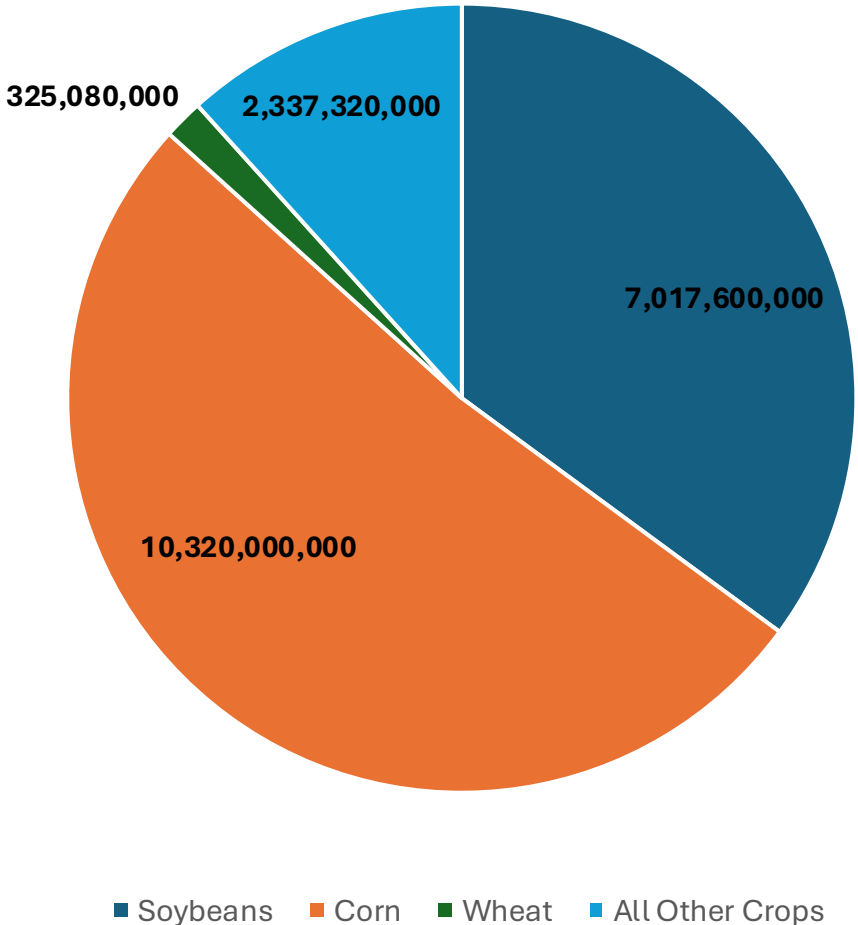

# Revenue from Crop Harvest

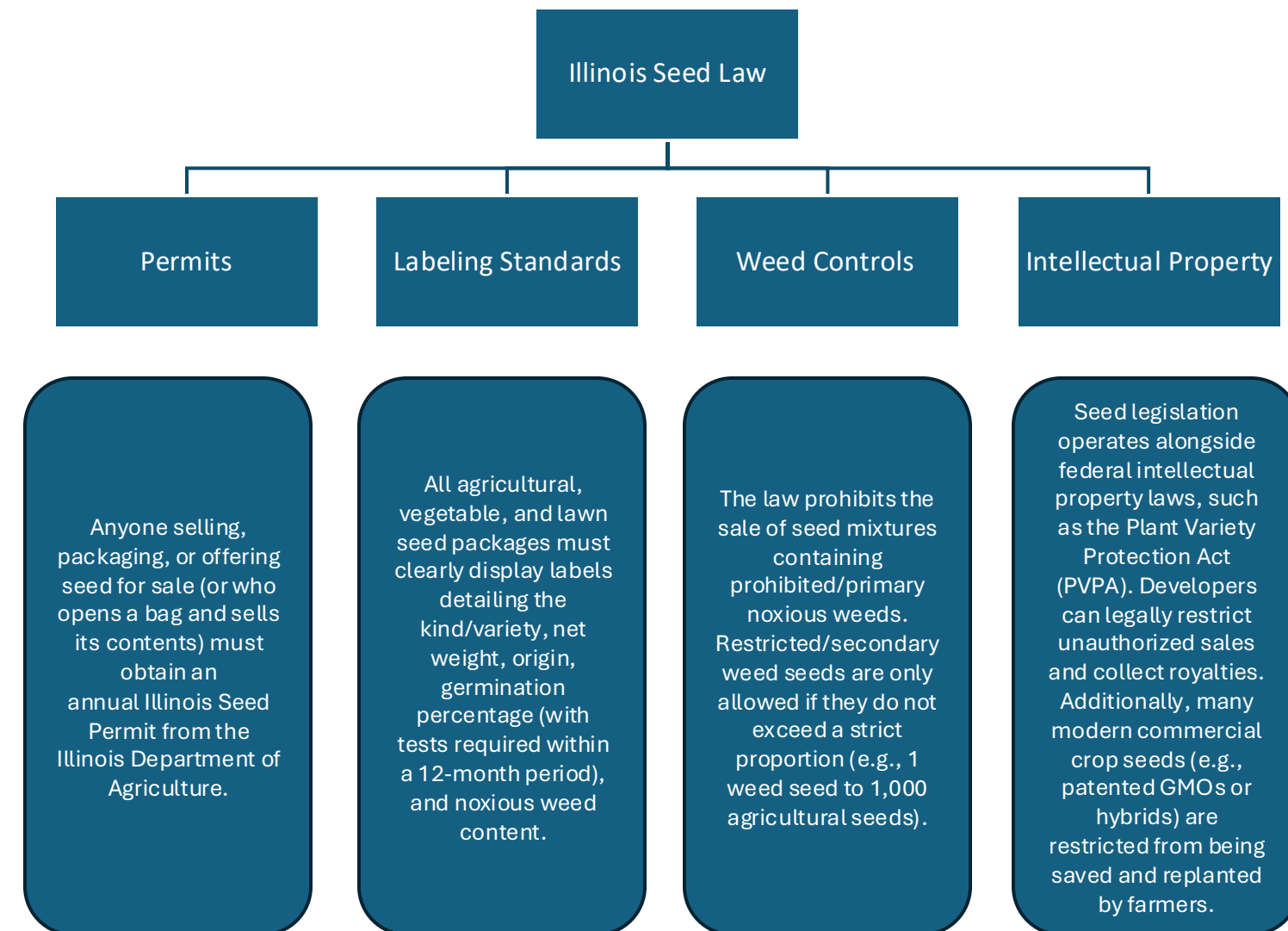
Revenue from Crops in Illinois (2024)

# Seed Regulations



**Legislation on seed in Illinois is governed by Illinois Seed Law (505 ILCS 110/) and the Illinois Administrative code (Title 8, Part 230)**

# Fertilizer Regulation

Illinois Fertilizer regulation is primarily governed by the Illinois Fertilizer Act of 1961 which covers registration, safe handling, environmental regulations, and licensing of commercial fertilizers

## Commercial Ag and Licensing

Any person or company who's name appears on a label must obtain a fertilizer application license.

All fertilizer made or distributed in Illinois has to be registered with the Illinois Department of Agriculture and be inspected

## Residential Lawn Fertilizer Restrictions

It is required to use a deflector or specialized application equipment to apply fertilizer within a 3 foot buffer of any body of water. Without the buffer you must remain 15 feet away.

Applying fertilizer is illegal on frozen or water saturated ground. Some exemptions of these regulations are commercial farmlands, agricultural land, golf courses, and lawn repair products.

# Pesticide Regulation

Legislation on Pesticides in Illinois is primarily brought to us by the Illinois Pesticide Act. This act oversees the registration of product, its use, distribution, environmental regulations, and provides fines that can range from \$750-\$10,000. Federally, pesticide use is regulated by the EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) and governed by the statute FIFRA. (Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act)

## EPA

- The EPA was created on Dec. 2, 1970, to protect human health and the environment
- Oversees land, sea, and air
- Reviews any chemical that goes on the market

## FIFRA

- FIFRA was enacted in 1996 to authorize the EPA to regulate the distribution, sale, production, and use of pesticide in the US
- The EPA's decisions involving FIFRA must agree with other applicable statutes

## Other Legislature

- Endangered Species Act (ESA)
  - Protects endangered animals, plants, and their habitats
- Illinois Pesticide Act
  - Creates further rules and restrictions on pesticide use in the state of Illinois

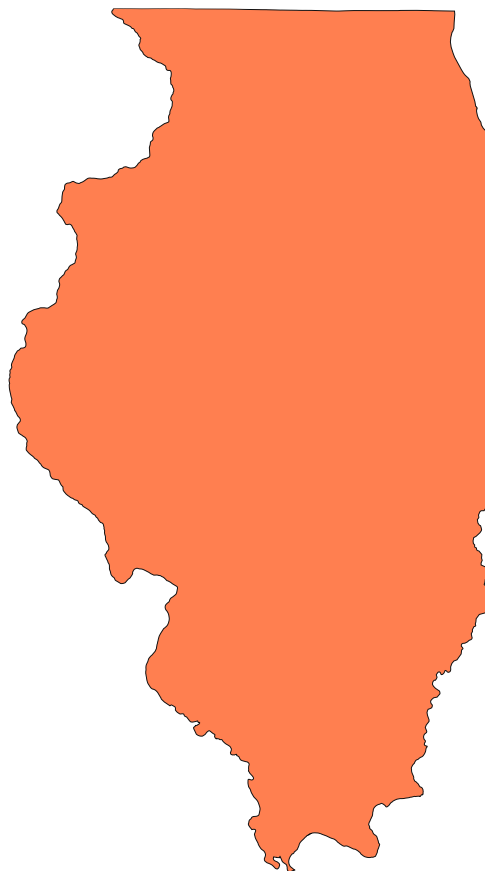


## Livestock

# Livestock raised in Illinois

In 2019, Illinois' livestock industry contributed more than \$31.8 billion in economic activity and supported more than 91,000 jobs. For every \$100 dollars of output created by Illinois Livestock, \$80 of additional economic activity is created outside of the industry

### Cattle

- In 2025, Illinois cattle inventory hovered around 1,000,000
- Roughly 324,000 of these were dedicated as beef cattle, 76,000 dairy designated

### Swine

- Illinois ranks 4th in state hog inventory
- Nearly 17 million hogs sold in 2017

### Poultry

- Illinois has roughly 7.2 million egg laying hens, 986,000 turkeys, and 290,000 meat chickens
- Recently, the temporary ban on exhibition/sale of poultry has been lifted by the state of Illinois due to the slowed spread of the H5N1 virus

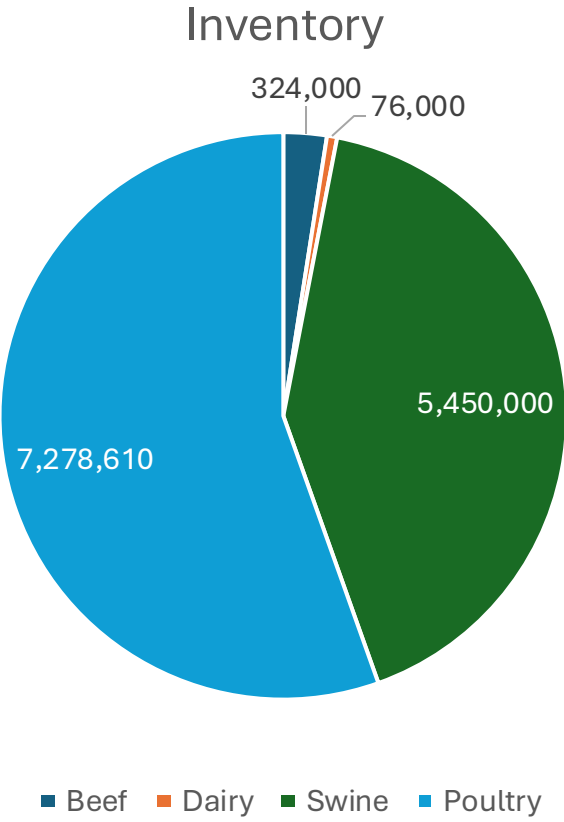
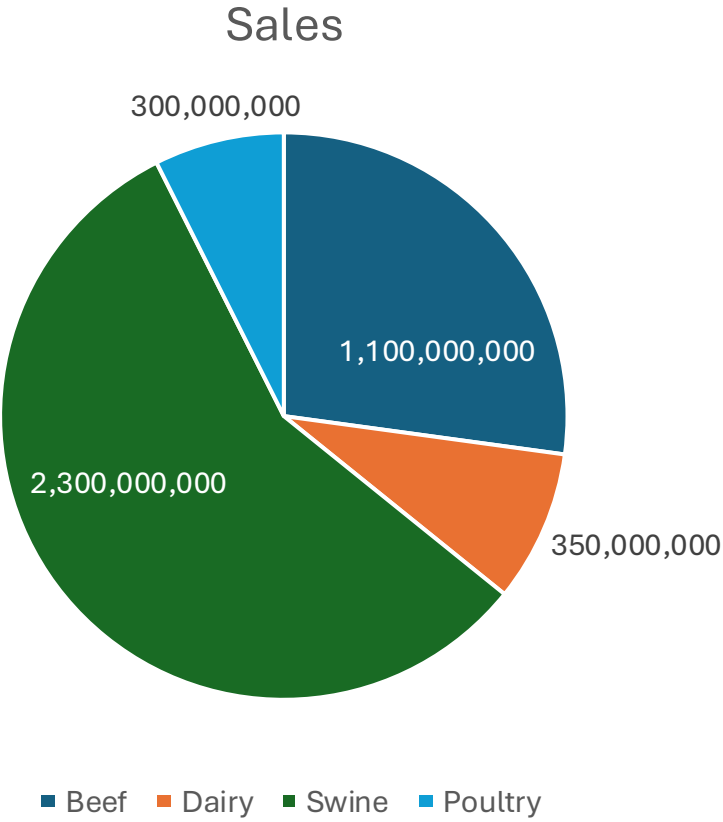
### Specialty Livestock

- The state currently has an inventory of around 32,000 goats, and 55,000 sheep and lambs
- Illinois has a growing aquaculture industry with over 9 million dollars in average annual sales

# Livestock Regulations

Livestock is largely regulated by state agencies rather than federal. The regulations fall into 4 main categories: Animal Health, Management, Containment, and Backyard Livestock.

## Health

- Livestock imports must meet Illinois requirements and all interstate regulations
- All Livestock Facilities must be registered with the state for rapid disease tracing

## Management

- You must be licensed to manage 300+ animals
- The Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) regulates waste usage

## Containment

- Free Roam Livestock is strictly prohibited by the [Illinois Domestic Animal Running at Large Act](#)

## Backyard Livestock

- Zoning is handled by local government. For example, a municipality can ban certain types of livestock if they are causing a nuisance
- For example, Roosters are banned within city limits within almost every town in Illinois

# Illinois Farm Bureau



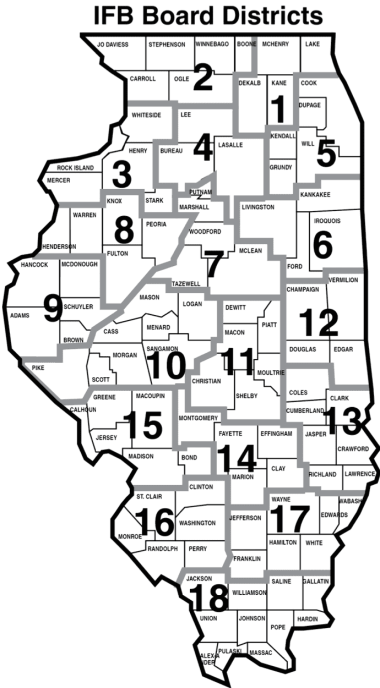
Founded in 1916, The Illinois Farm Bureau has "championed farmers interests, offering education, legislative advocacy, and community support."

The original name of the Illinois Farm Bureau was the Illinois Agricultural Association.

Illinois's Farm Bureau is the 5th largest in the US with around 400,000 members. 74,000-78,000 of these members have voting rights. A majority of the rest are affiliated with partner company, Country Financial.

Illinois divides its Farm Bureau into the following five divisions: Legal Services, Marketing & Communications, Finance, Field & Member Services, and Governmental Affairs & Commodities.

At the state level, the leadership team is made up of a President, Vice President, Young Leader Committee Chair, and IL Extension Agricultural Association Representative. All 18 districts also have a delegate.

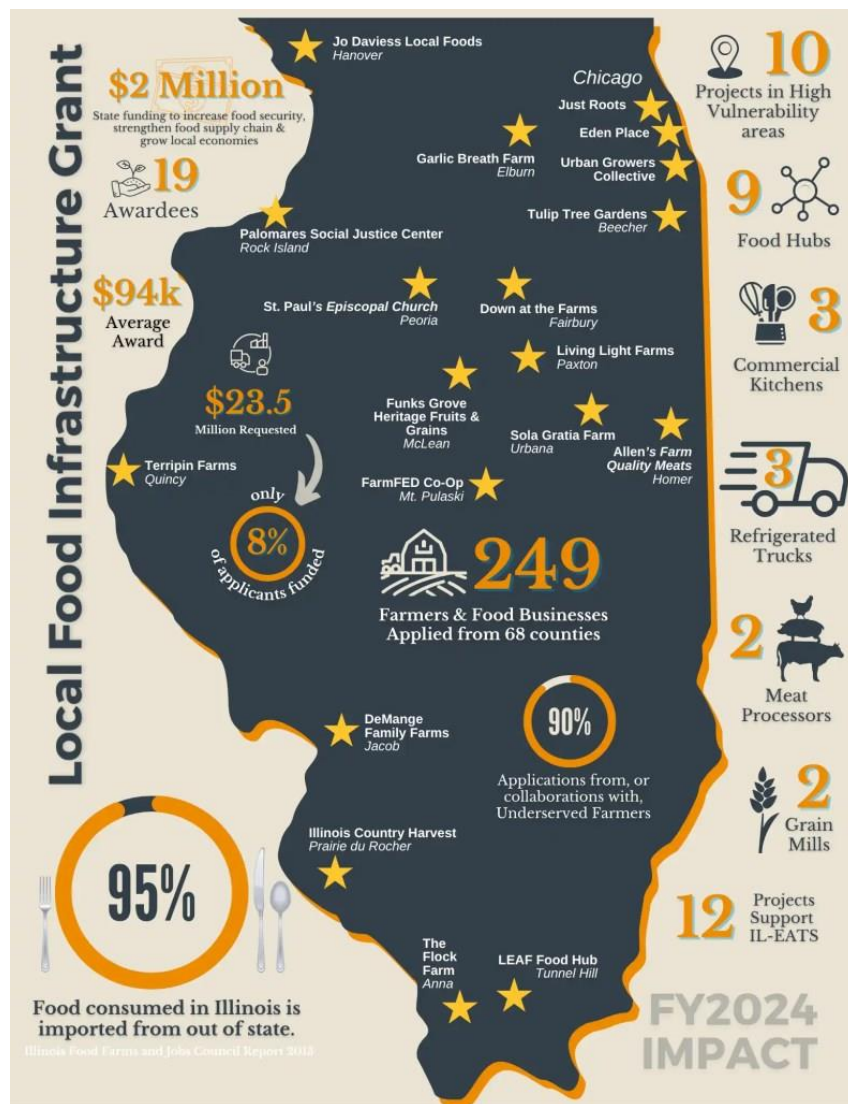

# Local Food Infrastructure



Illinois Resilient Food Systems Infrastructure Program (RFSI): Made to provide more and better markets for small farms and food services

Illinois has the third most farmers markets of any state per year giving consumers the opportunity to purchase their meats, dairy, fruits, and vegetables directly from the producer

In the 2025/26 season, at least 27 farms received awards from the RFSI program totaling over \$4.8 million in federal funding

# Dicamba

Dicamba imitates the plant growth hormone Auxin, which causes the plant to grow at a rapid rate and die

Dicamba first registered as a selective, systemic herbicide, used to control broadleaf weeds in agricultural and residential settings.

1967

Dicamba is first registered by the EPA for Over-the-Top uses on dicamba resistant cotton and soybeans. This was later extended in 2018.

2005

Monsanto releases a Dicamba tolerant crop trait, as well as the following statement: "[It is] effective against most broadleaf weeds, including weeds that are hard to control. However, it is harmful to crops such as soybeans, canola and cotton, which also are broadleaf plants. The new tech. will allow the development of soybean and other broadleaf crops that are highly tolerant to treatment with dicamba."

2020

In February of 2020, the EPA registered 3 new dicamba products, Xtendimax, Engenia, and Tavium. These 3 products were more heavily regulated due to the U.S Court of Appeals for the 9th circuit finding the EPA to have "substantially understated risks that it acknowledged and failed entirely to acknowledge other risks."

2024 - Pres.

In 2024 the US District Court of Arizona vacated the 2020 ruling with an existing stocks order so there were no legal Over the Top Dicamba labels for the 2025 growing season. In early 2026, the EPA reapproved Engenia, Tavium, and Xtendimax (Stryax) through the 2027 growing season. There are still battles underway over the legality and application of Dicamba

Dicamba is commonly used on weeds that have become Glyphosate (roundup) resistant such as Marehail, Pigweed, and Waterhemp

# New World Screwworm

The full-grown New World Screw Worm Fly lays eggs on a warm-blooded animal's open wound

On June 3rd, 2026, USDA confirmed the first case in the US of this outbreak of New World Screwworm

There have been no cases confirmed in Humans in the United States and the risk of NWS for humans remains low

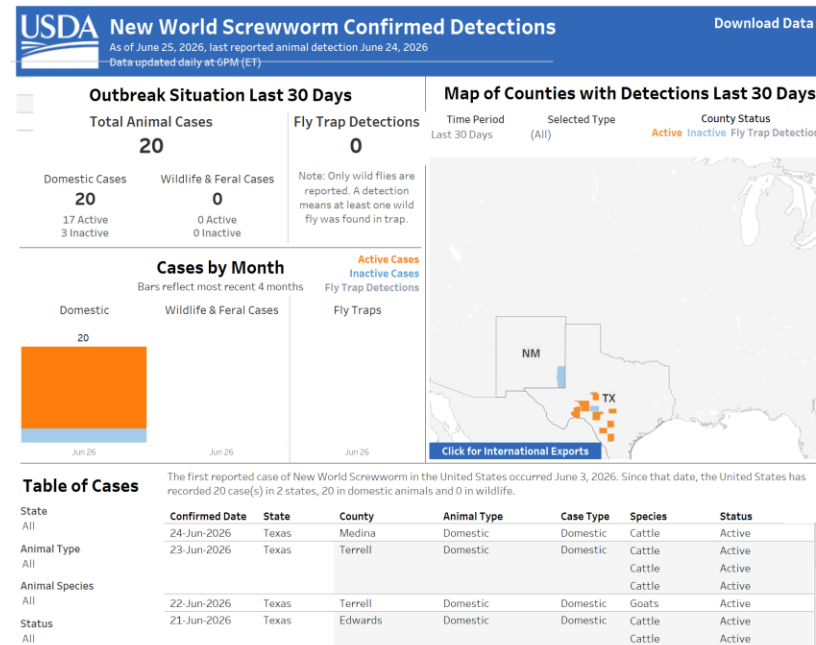
After roughly a week of pupation, a full-grown fly emerges from the ground and restarts the process



The eggs hatch within a few hours and the larvae starts to feed on the wound

The Animal is left with an infected, further injured wound that can lead to more health problems, notably blindness

Larvae fall off of the wound after feeding on it for roughly a week, onto the ground where they then burrow and pupate



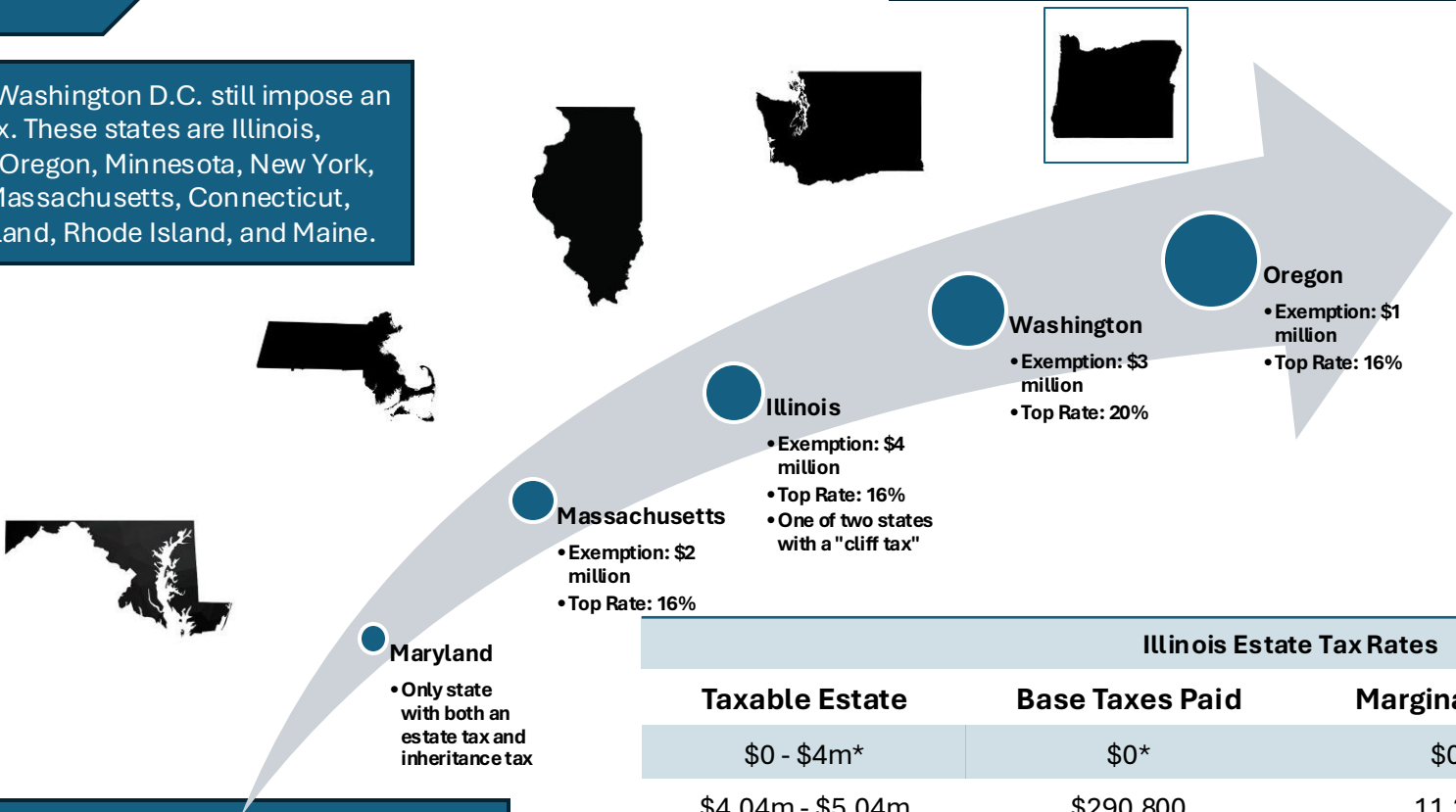

# Estate Tax

An estate tax is levied on someone's assets following their passing, before they are distributed to heirs.

12 states and Washington D.C. still impose an estate tax. These states are Illinois, Washington, Oregon, Minnesota, New York, Vermont, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Hawaii, Maryland, Rhode Island, and Maine.



The estate tax in Illinois is applied to anyone with estates worth over \$4 million. The rate is graduated up to 16%. This is much more oppressive than the current federal exemption, who's cost is \$15 million. A graduated tax increases in rate as higher dollar amounts are reached.
